Maine Regional Library System

The Maine Regional Library System was created to improve library service for the citizens of Maine. Membership consists of public, school, academic, and special libraries. Each of Maine's three library districts, Northeastern, Central, and Southern hosts an Area Reference and Resource Center. They are located at the Bangor (NMLD) and Portland (SMLD) public libraries and the Maine State Library in Augusta (CMLD). Each district includes a District Council and District Consultant.

Mission: The purpose of the Maine State Library is to lead in efforts that will provide, broaden, and improve access to information and library services regardless of location of residency. To accomplish this effort the Maine State Library is divided into two divisions: Reader and Information Services and Library Development.

History: In 1836 Maine Legislature authorized the purchase of books and the Maine State Library began to grow. Along with the State archives and the State museum, the State Library resides in the Cultural Building, located at the State House complex in Augusta. It is unique in having a physical presence and for its combination of services for the public and for librarians, all within the same organization. The State Library, serving all citizens and visitors, provides access to its information, services, and policies in order to meet educational, informational, recreational and cultural needs.

The State Library is addressing changes in its traditional role under an older economy by focusing on new roles demanded by the present changing economy. No longer is the role of librarians to just gather and select information but instead to facilitate, organize, and access information.

The mission of ACTEM is to enhance and influence education in Maine through the use of technology. Any Maine educator interested in or having responsibility for computer technology in K-12 education may join for \$10 annually.

ACTEM offers:

- Provide opportunities for the professional growth that are not easily supported by the state organizations within the region.
- Provide a strong regional voice at the national level.
